Spring is here! We have been getting rain and that's been helping the trees green up! Who doesn't like free natural fertilization? By now you should have finished repotting your deciduous/conifer trees. You can still slip pot trees, which consists of moving a tree to a slight bigger pot without disturbing the roots. Temperatures are still dropping to the high 40s, so if you have temperature sensitive trees, make sure to take care of them nightly. Do not repot tropicals yet. You will want to wait until nightly temperatures are above 60° consistently for 30 days. Feel free to ask other members or on our Facebook page if you have any questions.

Kusamono artist Young Choe will be having four workshops with a limited of 10 people per workshop. On April 4<sup>th</sup> at the Lions Field and Saturday April 6<sup>th</sup> at Hattie and Kevin's home. Workshop fees are \$35/pp for SABS members and \$50/pp for non-members.

The April 4<sup>th</sup> workshop will have its first class from 4pm-6pm followed by second class from 6:30pm-8:30pm.



## Monthly Tips by Jonas Dupuich of Bonsai Tonight

### Early Spring Work

March 17, 2024

If you ask me what my favorite time of year in the garden is, I'll say early spring, right after repotting. It's the one time of year when everything looks good and there's little work to do.

Or so I used to think. In recent years, I've found that spring is a busy time for maintenance tasks and a key season for setting up trees for success over the remainder of the growing season. Here are some of the tasks that require attention as trees start growing in spring.

**Replace top dressing** – Surface soil can break down, collect weeds, and become crusted with broken down fertilizer over the course of the growing season. For trees that aren't repotted, replace the top 1/2" or so of old soil with fresh soil (and moss, if needed) to facilitate watering.



**Pinching** – For mature specimens where the goal is to improve branch density, pinching begins as soon as trees start growing in spring on species like Japanese maple and Japanese beech. Pinch new shoots on vigorous areas of the tree (often the upper branches) and let weaker areas (like the interior shoots) gain vigor.



**Removing flowers and fruit** – For species that produce fruit or seed pods after blooming, remove any flowers when they start to fade (or fruit if you don't remove the flowers in time). Chojubai, wisteria, and plums commonly produce fruit or seed pods if the flowers aren't removed quickly so checking these trees frequently through the blooming season can help you prevent fruit from forming.



## Bonsai Term(s) of the Month

### Anatomy of a Tree

#### A) Outer Bark

- tree's protection from world. Continually renewed from within. Keeps out rain but prevents evaporation. Insulates against cold & heat. Wards off insects.

#### B) Inner Bark

- or "phloem", pipeline through food is passed to rest of tree. Short lived before becoming bark.

#### C) Cambium

- growing part of trunk. Produces new bark & wood in response to hormones (auxins) that pass down through phloem with food. Auxins stimulates cell growth & are produced by leaf buds.

#### D) Sapwood

- tree's pipeline for water moving to leaves. New wood that turns to heartwood.

#### E) Heartwood

- central, supporting pillar of the tree. Though dead doesn't decay or lose strength.

## Monthly Tips, cont.

**Removing suckers** – Some species (like chojubai or coast redwood) produce shoots from the roots when they start growing in spring. Remove unneeded suckers as soon as they appear.



**Fertilizing** – Young trees, species that will be decandled (like black or red pine), and species like plums appreciate receiving additional resources early in the season. Fertilize evergreen bonsai when they start growing in spring (or earlier if temperatures are mild). Wait a few weeks after repotting for trees you need to repot.

**Catching up on fall work** – If you haven't finished pruning, plucking, and wiring everything in the garden, now's a good time to do it. Hold off when there's enough new growth that it would be difficult to do the work without damaging new shoots.

Depending on your weather and the species you work with there may be many more tasks to do in your garden as trees wake up from dormancy.
